#### From the Director's Desk!

After a HOT and very wet summer, bring on **FALL**! Some folks are doing their fall cleaning and wanting to toss things. And I may be able to help them make some money by doing "**How to Sell on eBay**" session on Sat., Oct. 13 from 10 a.m. - Noon. We will go through the basics of taking photos, writing descriptions, and listing items on eBay. You will be surprised on what folks buy on eBay!

We want to remind our patrons that the library will be closed on Fri., Oct. 19 for **Staff Development Day**. We will be open regular hours on Sat., Oct. 20.

The library will have its **4th Annual Basket Raffle** beginning Mon., Oct. 15 - Noon on Mon., Oct. 29. We are planning on 100 baskets or items for the raffle. Some of our themes include dog care, the Iron Pigs, back to school, Grillin' 'n' Chillin', Crayola Experience, America on Wheels, Christmas, Hershey Gardens, Lehigh Valley Zoo, and the Strasburg Railroad, just to name a few! Raffle baskets will be displayed for 2 weeks. You may purchase tickets starting Mon., Oct. 8. Tickets will be \$5 per sheet of 25 tickets or five sheets for \$20. (That is 125 tickets for \$20, and that is a bargain!) You won't need to be present to win, but we will need your name and phone number on the ticket stub when you buy your tickets.

The Whitehall Township Public Library will be a collecting point for **Senior Care Annual Coat & Boot Drive**. Bring your new or gently used boots, coats, snowsuits, and snowpants to the library. They will be donated to those in need in the area. Adult and children's items are needed and in ALL sizes.

Our library is open 64 hours a week but there are times when you may need information outside of these hours, and we are still **OPEN** for you - **online**! If you have a current library card, a computer and internet, you can log in to one of 27 online databases listed on the right-side of our website. One of these databases is called **PA POWER Library**. This is an online portal to all that PA libraries offer to residents of PA. You can find reliable information on biographies, business, college resources, elementary and secondary school resources, health care, consumer purchases, personal finances, and more.

**NewsBank** provides a comprehensive collection of reliable news sources covering a wide array of topics and issues. This source includes full text articles about topics such as business, health, social issues, politics, government, people, and sports from all over the world.

Are you looking for a way to help your library? #### Halloween Fun





# Database Spotlight: Tumble Books

Want to help your kids boost their reading skills? Want to expose them to a bigger variety of reading material? The library has three eBook databases to help our younger patrons read, watch, and learn a variety of material.

- TumbleBook Library This collection of animated read-along e-books has books for grades K-6. There are also math stories as well as educational videos, puzzles, and games.
- TumbleBook Cloud Junior This collection has e-books, audiobooks, and videos for grades 3-6. Look for nonfiction and fiction titles, which even includes some graphic novels.
- TumbleBook Cloud Find e-books for middle schoolers and high schoolers here some for class and some for fun. Teens taking advanced classes or who enjoy more challenging material can especially get some use out of the drama, poetry, and AP English sections.
